The World Federation of the Deaf (WFD) was established in Rome, Italy in 1951, and is an international non-governmental organisation with membership comprising of 132 Ordinary Members, Individual Members, Associate Members and International Members. The WFD also has eight (8) Regional Secretariats and one (1) Regional Cooperating Member. WFD's office is located in Helsinki, Finland.

The WFD has a consultative status within the United Nations (UN) system. In this role, the WFD works closely with the UN and its various agencies in promoting the human rights of deaf people in accordance with the principles and objectives of the UN Charter, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities and other general acts and recommendations of the UN and its specialised agencies, e.g., the UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), the UN Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), the International Labor Organization (ILO) and the World Health Organization (WHO). WFD also has participatory status within the Council of Europe (COE) and is a member of International Disability Alliance (IDA).

# 8th SESSION OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE STATE PARTIES (COSP) TO THE CONVENTION OF THE RIGHTS OF PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES

In the second week of June, I travelled to New York City, New York, USA to be a member of the official delegation of the International Disability Alliance to attend the Civil Society Forum and the 8th Conference of State Parties (COSP). I also participated in a number of diplomatic meetings with Ministers and Ambassadors from New Zealand, Belgium and Australia to discuss the importance of ensuring that people with disabilities are included in the indicators as the part of the framework for the Sustainability Development Goals. ### CLIN D'OEIL FESTIVAL, REIMS, FRANCE

I was honoured to be one of the key presenters at the Opening Ceremony of the Clin d'Oeil Festival in Reims, France. The festival aims to promote deaf artists and deaf culture, to promote access to culture for everyone and to provide an educational and artistic program for young people. The main aim was to promote the diversity and the worldwide richness of deaf culture based on supporting Sign Languages values and the capacity they have to produce real masterpieces. The next festival will be held in 2017 and I highly recommend that you attend! The Festival is an enjoyable weekend of full access to the world of deaf culture, arts, theatre and various signed languages. WFD Board Member Ms Hanne Berge Kvitaer and I had the pleasure of seeing more than 3,000 participants gathered together for this cultural festival over the weekend. # 22ND INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS ON THE EDUCATION OF THE DEAF (ICED), ATHENS, GREECE

I attended the 22nd ICED in Athens, Greece as one of their Opening Statement presenters. I addressed the topic of "Full Accessibility to Deaf Education through Sign Language" which was received very well by the participants at the Congress. It was challenging that there was a lack of accessibility for deaf participants to attend the full Congress due to a limited number of International Sign Interpreters provided. Mr James E. The Dr Liisa Kauppinen Fund was officially established during the Opening Ceremony of the World Congress in Istanbul, Turkey, on 28 July 2015 in honour of its Honorary President, Dr Liisa Kauppinen, for her relentless work in advancing the human rights of deaf people.

The proceeds from the fund will go towards conducting sustainable human rights activities undertaken by the WFD such as:

- Data collection on the human rights situation of the Deaf Community
- Production of accessible human rights materials
- Capacity building training with a human rights focus

The fund targets the wider deaf community, especially deaf women. The main goal of these activities is to empower deaf individuals so that they are aware of their rights and are able to act and exert influence to overcome exclusion.

The World Federation of the Deaf (WFD), its Members and the 1,312 participants from 97 countries gathered at the XVII World Congress of the World Federation of the Deaf in Istanbul, Turkey, 28<sup>th</sup> July – 1<sup>st</sup> August 2015,

*Recalling* the Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon of the United Nations, in his message to the Congress, stressed that "recognizing disability as a part of human diversity is essential for appreciating the abilities of people with disabilities."

*Emphasises* deaf people are an important and crucial part of humanity, with unique cultural and linguistic contributions to human diversity, and

*Declares* its collective commitment to strengthening diversity in deaf communities around the world.

In the furtherance of these aims, the XVII World Congress of the World Federation of the Deaf,

*Urges* full adherence to the principles of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities by governments around the world.

*Reaffirms* its commitment to the promotion of the full achievement of the human rights enshrined in the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, alongside all other human rights treaties.

*Calls* for the United Nations and international partners to take measures to promote the full participation of deaf people in human rights reporting processes, including the development of parallel reports to the Committee on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.

Recognises sign languages as a part of linguistic

diversity, noting with concern a number of sign languages around the world are faced with endangerment.

*Recognises* the importance of making parents aware of the linguistic human rights and cultural rights of deaf and deaf-blind children and youth,

*Calls on* the United Nations, governments, and research partners to recognise and promote the multiple benefits of sign language in education for all children, collecting and publicising examples of good practice, as well as statistical information on the achievement of deaf children in education,

*Emphasises* the need for measures on the international and national levels aimed at strengthening the educational rights of deaf children, including the promotion of bilingual education in line with Article 24 of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities as a means for deaf people to fully participate in society, including in higher education, the workforce, and political and civic life.

*Calls attention to* deaf-centered pedagogy in teacher training and the promotion of visual learning and research in the education of deaf and deaf-blind children and youth,

*Strongly emphasises* the need for equitable access by women and minorities in deaf communities, including ethnic minorities, deaf people with multiple disabilities, deaf Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender communities, deaf immigrants, and rural deaf people in all aspects of society,

*Encourages* measures which promote access, emphasising access in sign language, to health care for deaf and deaf-blind people around the world, including mental health, counselling services and health education, with women's health issues as a special area of focus,

*Advocates* for the right to enjoy the highest attainable standard of health care for deaf and deafblind people, in line with Article 25 of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, especially those living in remote and isolated communities,

*Affirms* that all emerging and current information and communication technology must include universal design features enabling deaf and deafblind people to enjoy a full and barrier-free life, noting the important role accessible technology plays in all facets of life including education, employment, emergency services and social interaction,

*Notes* that the United Nations should collate and disseminate information and encourage independent and neutral research about deaf people that is accessible to deaf communities around the world, especially deaf people in the Global South,

*Observes* many good examples of best practice in working with deaf people around the world and calls on other organisations such as national deaf organisations, non-governmental organisations, educational institutions and international agencies to disseminate examples of good practice,

*Calls upon* international and national aid agencies to specifically involve deaf people in development projects. Deaf people in countries where projects are based to be included in all aspects of such projects, as well as enabled to participate in international meetings.

The XVII World Congress of the World Federation of the Deaf so declares its commitment to cooperation between the World Federation of the Deaf, national organisations of deaf people, World Federation of the Deaf Regional Secretariats, international agencies, non-governmental organisations and the United Nations, its member states and its agencies in the full achievement of these aims.

WORKING TOGETHER – THE MANUAL FOR SIGN LANGUAGE WORK WITHIN DEVELOPMENT COOPERATION SUCCESSFULLY LAUNCHED!

The Manual is available on-line at <u>http://www.slwmanual.info</u>

The Manual for Sign Language Work within Development Cooperation was successfully launched at the one-day WFD Workshop addressed to members of the WFD on 25<sup>th</sup> July, and 29<sup>th</sup> July during the WFD XVII Congress in Istanbul, Turkey. The Manual is a joint publication of the WFD and the Finnish Association of the Deaf (FAD). In Istanbul, the working process and content of the Manual was presented to the audience by Mr Florjan Rojba, Mr Arttu Liikamaa and Dr Karin Hoyer. The web publication "Working Together – Manual for Sign Language Work within Development Cooperation" is a set of guidelines and examples of best practice on how to conduct sign language work together with Deaf Community advocates. It is intended to be a tool for enhancing human rights of deaf people through sign language work in practice.

Sign language documentation and research is the starting point for the empowerment of the Deaf Community in sign language work. This Manual emphasises the importance of a community-based approach, where deaf signers are conducting sign language work in practice themselves.

The Sign Language Work manual incorporates several important elements, and entails much more than compiling a sign language dictionary. The focus of the Manual is to awaken the linguistic awareness of the Deaf Community, and to create opportunities for deaf people to learn about



linguistics, research methods, and human rights issues, which in turn increases linguistic awareness, capacities and skills. Applying the Sign Language Work manual into practice may eventually lead to legal or governmental recognition of a country's sign language.

The seven chapters of the Manual cover the following topics:

- 1. Introduction framework, target groups, and key messages
- 2. Basic information on sign languages and Sign Language Work
- 3. Starting Sign Language Work initial survey and planning of the work
- 4. Elements needed for Sign Language Work & working methods
- 5. Topics for Sign Language Work training
- 6. Best practices and challenges e.g. concerning communication, involving the Deaf Community, and implementation of the work in practice
- Summary "Do not" common basic mistakes that should be avoided

The Manual aims to share ideas about how Sign Language Work should be conducted. Deaf Community members can acquire the knowledge and skills that they need to improve their situation in society with the support of an advisor. This Balkan model of Sign Language Work presented in the Manual has been implemented by the Finnish Association of the Deaf in development cooperation projects together with the Deaf Communities in Albania and Kosovo.

The frame of reference used in the Manual is the United Nations Convention on the Rights of

Persons with Disabilities (CRPD). The UN CRPD recognises that equality and the human rights of deaf people depend upon access to sign language. The Manual also follows the policies set out by the WFD.

The information in the Manual is available both in International Sign and in written English. Target groups of the Manual are deaf people (in low-tomiddle-income countries), advisors working with Deaf Community advocates, organisations and institutions funding and implementing development projects, as well as stakeholders, governmental institutions and representatives collaborating with Deaf Communities.

The Manual is a result of cooperation between the FAD, the WFD, the Albanian National Association of the Deaf, and the Kosovar Association of the Deaf.

### 2015 INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS ON THE EDUCATION OF THE DEAF (ICED)

Representing the Maryland School for the Deaf, (USA), I attended the 22<sup>nd</sup> International Congress on the Education of the Deaf (ICED) in Athens, Greece in July 5-9, 2015. The five day experience was exhilarating as I interacted with my fellow colleagues from all corners of the world under the shadows of the ancient Acropolis, the birthplace of democracy.

650 individuals from 61 countries attended the 22<sup>nd</sup> Congress. Of the 650 attendees, 122 were deaf and hard of hearing individuals. There were a total of 440 presentations, nine plenary presentations, 88 presentations in 17 symposia, 262 paper presentations, and 81 posters. Many remember the 2<sup>nd</sup> ICED as the Milan Conference 1880 where the of attendees overwhelming voted to support the "pure oral method" as the superior method in the education of deaf children and youth. The 21st ICED in Vancouver, Canada in 2010 brought forth a historic resolution titled "A New Era: Deaf Participation and Collaboration." This document authored by the British Columbia Deaf Community and the 2010 ICED Organizing Committee basically rejected all resolutions passed at the 1880 ICED at Milan,

Italy and promoted the use of sign languages and Deaf citizens' participation in decision-making in all aspects of their lives.

The Athens Congress carried on the spirit of the Vancouver Congress. The theme of the Athens Congress was "Educating Diverse Learners: Many Ways, One Goal". Several keynote speakers emphasized the need to meet the diverse needs of students, and being open to all language and communication philosophies as well as different pedagogical approaches.

Unfortunately, there was a shortage of interpreters at the Athens Congress. Only about 40% of the presentations had International Sign interpreters. Also, only one workshop room had CART (Communication Access Real-Time Translation) captioning. This led to a series of meetings among deaf and hard of hearing attendees, and eventually a document titled, "The Athens Declaration on Access for Deaf Participants at the International Congress of the Deaf (ICED)". Deaf and hard of hearing attendees paid the full registration fee of 850 dollars, but were not able to access all of the workshops.

Key provisions of the Athens Declaration are...

"Therefore, be it further resolved that members of ICED organizing committees henceforth will ensure the provision of universal language access for all participants in International Sign and English (printed, captioned, and spoken)...

"Therefore, be it further resolved that members of the ICED Host Selection Committee will immediately develop guidelines for future conferences to ensure universal language access in International Sign and English (printed, captioned, and spoken), including guidelines for scheduling of, budgeting for, and recruitment of qualified interpreters..."

The Athens Declaration received 312 signatures from the Congress attendees.

It is with hope that the next ICED held in Brisbane, Australia in July 2020 and beyond will be 100% accessible to all attendees. It is inconceivable in this time and age that an international conference on deaf education would not be accessible to all attendees. After all, our beliefs, teachings and research all lead to full, direct, and clear access to information, as well as collaboration between deaf, hard of hearing, and hearing individuals.

On 2 August, the 193 Member States of the United Nations reached agreement on <u>the outcome</u> <u>document that will constitute the new post-2015</u> <u>sustainable development agenda</u> that was adopted in September 2015 by world leaders at the Sustainable Development Summit in New York.

Concluding a negotiating process that has spanned than two years featured more and the unprecedented participation of civil society, the countries agreed to an ambitious agenda that features 17 new sustainable development goals that aim to end poverty, promote prosperity and well-being protecting while people's the environment by 2030.

The September 2015 Summit where the new agenda was adopted, "will chart a new era of sustainable development in which poverty will be eradicated, prosperity shared and the core drivers of climate change tackled," said United Nations Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon, adding that the United Nations system stands ready to support the implementation of the new agenda, which builds on the successful outcome of the Third International Conference on Financing for Development in Addis Ababa, and which, he said, will also contribute to achieve a meaningful agreement in the twenty-first session of the Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (COP21) in Paris in December.

More than 150 world leaders attended the Sustainable Development Summit at the United Nations headquarters 25 to 27 September in New York to formally adopt the outcome document of the new agenda. The new sustainable development goals, and the broader sustainability agenda build on the success of the Millennium Development Goals, but also go much further, addressing the root causes of poverty and the universal need for development that works for all people. The preamble of the 29-page text, "Transforming Our World: The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable <u>Development</u>", states that "We are resolved to free the human race from the tyranny of poverty and want and to heal and secure our planet." It also states that "We are determined to take the bold and transformative steps which are urgently needed to shift the world onto a sustainable and resilient path. As we embark on this collective journey, we pledge that no one will be left behind."

THE UN COMMITTEE ON THE RIGHTS OF PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES CLOSED ITS <u>14TH</u> <u>SESSION</u> (17 AUGUST- 4 SEPTEMBER 2015) AND <u>4TH PRE-</u> SESSION (7-11 SEPTEMBER)

During the session, the Committee held interactive dialogues with <u>Kenya</u>, <u>Ukraine</u>, <u>Gabon</u>, <u>Mauritius</u>, <u>Brazil</u>, <u>Qatar</u> and the <u>European Union</u> and adopted Concluding Observations on each, as well as the list of issues on Portugal.

The Committee also adopted a <u>statement on</u> <u>disability inclusion for the World Humanitarian</u> <u>Summit</u> and guidelines on the right to liberty and security of persons with disabilities, Article 14 of the Convention.

The following thematic side events took place during the 14<sup>th</sup> session and were webcast live by IDA:

- <u>Violence against Woman and Girls with</u> <u>Disabilities – Intersectional and Double</u> <u>Violence in Medical and Institutional</u> <u>Settings, World Network of Users &</u> <u>Survivors of Psychiatry</u>

At its formal closing, the Committee made the following announcements:

- The 15<sup>th</sup> session of the Committee will be held from 29 March - 21 April 2016, during which it will review Serbia, Slovakia, Portugal, Chile, Lithuania, Uganda and Thailand, as well as adopt list of issues on Bolivia and Guatemala.
- It will be preceded by the 5<sup>th</sup> pre-session from 21
  24 March 2016 during which list of issues will be adopted on Columbia, Moldova, Ethiopia, Italy, Uruguay, and United Arab Emirates.



International Sign (IS) is commonly used at the General Assembly (GA) of the World Federation of the Deaf (WFD) and of the International Committee of Sports for the Deaf (ICSD) and, also in many other international meetings, conferences, and events.


The status of International Sign as a language has been debated for a long time due to its flexibility and possibilities as a communication system. A dictionary of Gestuno (British Association of the Deaf, 1975) was published for use in international communication, especially for conferences. It had a limited vocabulary, and did not include any grammar. The term Gestuno itself is no longer used. International Signs (IS) is the current and most used term, and IS varies depending on the language background of the signers who use it.
